UNPUBLISHED DECISION ON FEES AND COSTS¹

Petitioner Joseph Maus filed an application for attorneys' fees and costs on July 17, 2012. The Court awards the amount to which respondent does not object.

Mr. Maus claimed that the trivalent influenza vaccine caused him to suffer an adverse reaction and received compensation based upon the parties' stipulation. Decision, filed June 22, 2012. Because Mr. Maus received compensation, he is entitled to an award of attorneys' fees and costs. 42 U.S.C. § 300aa-15(e).

Mr. Maus seeks a total of **\$20,200.00** in attorneys' fees and costs for petitioner's counsel. Additionally, Mr. Maus filed a statement of costs in compliance with General Order No. 9, stating that he incurred no litigation expenses while pursuing this claim. Respondent stated that she had no objection to this application for attorneys' fees and costs.

After reviewing the request, the court awards a check made payable to petitioner and petitioner's attorney in the amount of **\$20,200.00** for attorneys' fees and other litigation costs. The court thanks the parties for their cooperative efforts in resolving this matter.

¹ The E-Government Act of 2002, Pub. L. No. 107-347, 116 Stat. 2899, 2913 (Dec. 17, 2002), requires that the Court post this decision on its website.
