FINAL ORDER

On March 1, 2021, the Supreme Court of California revoked Scott Michael Cantor's license to practice law. *See In re Scott Michael Cantor*, SBC-20-N-30251 and SBC-20-O-30252 (Ca. 2020). Mr. Cantor did not report to this Court this revocation as required by Rule 83.2(e) of the Rules of the United States Court of Federal Claims ("RCFC"). Mr. Cantor was suspended by this Court on June 2, 2020. ECF No. 6.

Mr. Cantor has been a member of this Court's bar since October 27, 1994 and has no pending cases. Under RCFC 83.2(c)(2), an attorney may be disciplined on the grounds of an act or omission that results in the disbarment or suspension of the attorney by another court. In addition, under RCFC 83.2(c)(4), an attorney may be disciplined on the grounds of failure to comply with the terms of RCFC 83.2, including failure to notify the Court in accordance with RCFC 83.2(e).

On May 7, 2021, the Court issued a renewed Order to Show Cause, as Mr. Cantor's discipline had changed from suspension to revocation. The new order directed Mr. Cantor to show cause within 30 days why he should not be disbarred from the practice of law before the United States Court of Federal Claims. ECF No. 9. The Order to Show Cause further stated that if no response was received, Mr. Cantor would be permanently disbarred from practice. *Id.* To date, Mr. Cantor has not responded to the Order to Show Cause. Therefore,

IT IS ORDERED that Scott Michael Cantor shall be disbarred from the practice of law before the United States Court of Federal Claims, *nunc pro tunc*, March 1, 2021, the date of the revocation of his license to practice law in California. The filing of any petition for reinstatement will be governed by RCFC 83.2(k)(1).
